#### Conference-Approved Literature

As you may know, the General Service Office is a repository of shared experience and functions as a resource center for A.A. members and groups who are looking for the shared experience of the Fellowship. Often this shared experience is helpful as groups work toward their group conscience decisions. G.S.O. does not set policy or perform any acts of 'government' for A.A. groups. So, while A.A. has conference-approved literature – see the attachment – it really just communicates that a piece of literature has gone through the conference process. However, things like what readings might be used at a group, the meeting format, announcements etc. are left up to the group conscience of each group. At the office we have heard of groups who use the St. Francis Prayer from the 12 & 12 for a mediation guide; others come up with their own instructions for sitting meditation (drawn from different meditation traditions) and have a period of meditation followed by a discussion of the 11 th Step; others use a recording (a CD or an App); and whether or not it's 3 minutes or 30 minutes is up to the group. Meditation has been part of A.A. since our earliest days. If you read books on A.A. history like "Dr. Bob and the Good Old Timers" it talks about how important morning meditation was to our early members. And obviously it's mentioned specifically in Step 11. But how it's done is up to the individual or, in a group setting, up to the group conscience. #### TRADITIONS CHECKLIST

Tradition Four: Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole.

- > Do I insist that there are only a few right ways of doing things in AA?
- Does my group always consider the welfare of the rest of AA? Of nearby groups? Of loners in Alaska? Of internationalists miles from port? Of a group in Rome or El Salvador?
- Do I put down other members" behavior when it is different from mine, or do I learn from it?
- > Do I always bear in mind that, to those outsiders who know I am in AA, I may to some extent represent our entire beloved fellowship?
- Am I willing to help a newcomer go to any lengths-his lengths, not mine-to stay sober?
- Do I share my knowledge of AA tools with other members who may not have heard of them?
