2020 International Convention of Alcoholics Anonymous July 2-5, 2020 Detroit, Michigan

The 2020 International Convention of Alcoholics Anonymous will be held July 2-5, 2020 in Detroit, Michigan with the theme "Love and Tolerance is our Code." A.A. members and guests from around the world will celebrate A.A.'s 85th year at this event with big meetings held Friday night, Saturday night and Sunday morning in the Ford Field Stadium.

As the time gets closer, additional information about the Convention and Detroit, our host city, will be provided.

Registration forms will be mailed in August 2019 to all GSR's, central offices, intergroups and international G.S.O.s. Online registration will be available September 9, 2019 on aa.org. Advanced registration for the convention between September 9, 2019 and April 14, 2020 will be \$115 (USD) per attendee. Registration after April 15, 2020 will be \$140 (USD) per attendee.
