

A Special note from our DCM

I would like to start by saying that you to all the members of A.A. for allowing me to be of service. When I first started coming to Alcoholics Anonymous, I was told to get a commitment every month and show up for that commitment every week. I didn't know it then, but I now know taking these commitments in the beginning helped me to stay sober one day at a time. I remember the crazy obsession to drink early in sobriety but showing up for the coffee commitment because that's what I was told to do. So, by the grace of God each day I went to bed sober. When I was 2 years sober, I was voluntold, I was going to be the group service representative for my home group. Four years later I am still highly involved with service work, because I still want to stay sober.

I am currently the District Committee Member for District 48. As we are all aware, the heart of A.A. is the group. Each group within the district elects a general service representative (G.S.R.). This G.S.R. attends the district meetings to be a voice for the group. At the district meeting the DCM is elected by the G.S.R.'s and chairs the district meetings for two consecutive years.

Essentially I act as the link between the G.S.R.'s, the area delegate, and General Service Conference. I am trusted to carry the collective group conscience of the district to the quarterly area meeting, and the annual General Service Conference. I return from all quarterly area meetings and assembly's with information of what is happening in the Area or at World Service, I am responsible for ensuring the G.S.R.'s stay informed about conference activities. The G.S.R.'s then take these activities back to their groups. This communication allows all the AA groups to participate in local, district, area, and world services. I love to be a small part in the large world of reaching out to the next sick and suffering alcoholic. So once again thank you for allowing me to be of service.
